

Registering for a BMJ Learning

As a new doctor at the Trust, you are expected to complete **3 pharmacy modules** on BMJ Learning: <http://learning.bmj.com/learning/home.html>

The modules are:

- 1) Drug errors in hospital
- 2) Survival guide: safe prescribing for surgical inpatients
- 3) Survival guide: safe prescribing for patients in hospital

This guide will take you through the process of how to:

- 1) Register for an OpenAthens account (required to access BMJ Learning)
- 2) Register for an account with BMJ Learning
- 3) Add the 3 modules to your BMJ Learning account.

Part 1: Registering with Athens



- 1) We recommend that you register for an OpenAthens password from a Trust PC. The form, will also ask you for your email; we recommend that you use your Trust email. If you register from a non-Trust device or use a non-Trust email then you will have to contact the library to complete the registration process: please email library@lthtr.nhs.uk
- 2) Fill in the form, making sure you select '**Lancashire Teaching Hospitals...**' as the organisation.

- 3) Accept the **terms and conditions** at the bottom and click '**Register**'.
- 4) Assuming that you registered from a Trust PC and entered your Trust email, then you will receive an email from OpenAthens. In this email you will receive your username and you need to click on the link to set your password. Once you have done this your account will be activate. If you do not receive an email, please contact the library at library@lthtr.nhs.uk

Part 2: Registering the doctor on BMJ Learning

Once you have activated your Athens account, you can now register for BMJ Learning.

- 1) Go to the following website: <https://new-learning.bmj.com/>
- 2) In the right hand corner of the screen click on '**Log in**', then select '**OpenAthens Users sign in here**'.



- 3) Search for your **institution** *Lancashire Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust* and select it from the menu:








Part 3: Adding the pharmacy modules to your portfolio


- 1) Use the search box to find the first module: *Drug errors in hospital practice*




- 2) Select the module by clicking on the title:



- 3) You will be taken to the module. Click **'Add to portfolio'** if you wish to complete the module at a later time. If you wish to start the module immediately, click **Start Module**. The module will automatically be added to your profile. You do not need to complete a module at a single sitting.




- 4) If you choose to add a module to your Portfolio, a box will pop up with the heading 'Add to BMJ Portfolio'. Click on 'Add'.


- 7) Now click on the '**BMJ Learning**' icon to go back to the main homepage:




- 8) From the main homepage, you can access your Portfolio to check that the 3 modules have been added. Click on '**My Portfolio**' in the top right-hand corner:
