Learning Environment

We would like to welcome you to your learning environment.

The Coronary Care team will provide a professional approach to patient centred care. The delivery of all services will be holistic, individualised and non-judgemental. In order to achieve a high standard of care delivery, practice will be research based within a multidisciplinary environment.

The Coronary Care Unit will provide learning opportunities, such as clinical experience of a Level 2 area, working with the multi- disciplinary team to care and manage patients with acute and chronic cardiac conditions, gaining exposure to clinical skills particularly important in cardiac nursing e.g. acquiring basic knowledge of the 12 Lead ECG and basic rhythm recognition. You will be able to explore the spoke placement opportunities, such as shadowing the Cardiac Specialist Nurses and visit the Cardiac Catheter Laboratory.

We always aim to improve our teaching and care and we would be grateful if you could please complete an evaluation questionnaire at the end of your placement on PARE.

We hope you will be very happy during your placement on CCU. If, for some reason you are concerned about this placement, please discuss with a senior member of staff, your Practice Assessor or your Practice Supervisor, so that we can assist you in making the most of your time and development on this unit.

<p>Cardiac Catheter Laboratory RPH</p> <p>Contact No: Ext 4382</p>	<p>Cardiologists/ Doctors Radiographers Staff Nurses</p>	<p>Students are able to observe clinical procedures such as Angiograms, insertion of Pacemakers and also be involved with the daily routine of the lab.</p> <p>Gain knowledge of how to care for and manage a patient following a procedure Gain experience in admitting and discharging a patient.</p>
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<p>Cardiac Rehabilitation Nurse</p> <p>Contact No: 5635</p>	<p>Specialist Nurse</p>	<p>This allows the student to follow and understand a patient's journey following an acute coronary event. Students are able to shadow the specialist nurse as they visit patients in hospital, listening to advice given. Observe and take part in Cardiac rehabilitation classes both in hospital and the community.</p>
<p>Heart Failure Specialist Nurse</p> <p>Contact No: Ext 7588</p>	<p>Specialist Nurse</p>	<p>Observe the input and advice given to patients with chronic heart failure in hospital and also in the community. Attend a clinic facilitated by the HFN. Students are able to gain more understanding about the treatment and management of these patients with this condition. Learn further about the importance of fluid restriction and medications used.</p>
<p>Cardiorespiratory Department</p> <p>Contact No: 5295</p>	<p>Physiologists and support staff</p>	<p>Students are able to observe the staff undertaking procedures such as Echocardiograms, Exercise Tolerance Tests, ECG'S and Pacemaker checks. The staff also attend the unit to assist at TOE's (Transoesophageal Echocardiograms) and temporary pacemaker insertions.</p>
<p>Critical care Outreach Team</p> <p>Contact No: Bleep 3456</p>	<p>CCOT Nurse</p>	<p>The student is able to shadow the specialist nurse when they attend the unit to assist in the care of an acutely unwell patient Observe the process of how to look after and manage a deteriorating patient Gain more understanding of the NEWS (National Early Warning Score) and what this means for the patient.</p>

Induction

The Local Induction process will take place throughout the first week of your placement.

This will comprise of:

- Trust and department orientation, including housekeeping information
- Location of emergency equipment
- IT access
- Reading & acknowledgement of Mandatory Trust policies such as Health & Safety, Fire Safety, Infection Control, Information Governance, Staff Code of Conduct, Social Networking and Dress Code policies.
- Adult Basic Life Support training if applicable
- Trust Moving & Handling Training if applicable
- COVID-related policies & procedure
- Orientation
- Professional voice: - freedom to speak up, datix, chain of command, open door policy
- An awareness of our Educational Governance Team- evaluation and importance of feedback
- Inter-professional Learning Sessions
- Practice Assessment Record and Evaluation (PARE) training, if applicable
- Collaborative Learning in Practice (CLiP™), if applicable
- How the role of Practice Development Facilitator can support you, where applicable



What to bring on your first day

Inter-professional Learning Sessions and eLearning Resources

At our Trust, our Education Team facilitates a yearly programme of Inter-professional Learning (IPL) sessions. This programme consists of various teaching sessions, delivered by our Specialist Teams, to support and enhance our learners and trainees' learning experience with us.

Inter-professional learning is an important part of your development and allows you to build professional relationships and communication skills with the wider multi-disciplinary teams. Our IPL sessions are valuable in supporting you to stretch your knowledge and experiences to enhance your clinical practice. They also help bridge the gap between theory and practice, allowing you to hold a deeper understanding of the topics discussed. Our sessions are open for all learners and trainees on placement at our Trust to attend and these learning opportunities are an extension to your learning environment; therefore, these hours need to be recorded on your timesheets. We encourage our staff to facilitate enabling a learner/trainee to attend these sessions.

Please note: You must inform your learning environment prior to attending a session. These IPL sessions need to be discussed in a timely manner with your learning environment.

You are required to complete a reflection on each of your IPL sessions, as well as documenting on your HEI documentation what you have learnt and how this relates to your current placement.

Support with evidencing your learning outcomes or proficiencies

Any staff member who is involved in coaching you can complete your learning log feedback.
