Learning Environment

We would like to welcome you to your learning environment.

The Hand Therapy Team at LTHTR has departments on both the Chorley and the Preston site. When your placement is confirmed with your educator, you will be informed whether your time with us will be site specific or cross site.

We are a fully integrated therapy team which means that Occupational Therapists and Physiotherapists have the same role within the department, having undergone extra training. Although your Educator will be specific to your chosen profession you will work with both disciplines, as well as our very skilled therapy assistants, in order to gain a good understanding of our field of work.

As a team, we accept referrals from a variety of sources however patients cannot self-refer. Our referrals are usually from an orthopaedic or a plastic surgery team and may be either trauma or elective patients. There are some exceptions to this, and GP's can also refer into our service.

Below is a link to a presentation which will give you a good overview of Hand Therapy and the areas with which we are involved and can make a difference. It also contains some information regarding documentation and common abbreviations.

Hand Therapy presentation

As a team we cover Orthopaedic and Plastics Clinics on both sites most days meaning that we see a number of patients on a 'walk-in' basis having been referred straight from these clinics. We also have a large number of bookable appointments each week.

At RPH, the team also run the Therapy Led Dressings Clinic (TLDC), in which patients are seen at an acute post-operative stage. At these appointments, dressings will be reduced, wounds checked and redressed as needed, stitches removed, splints and exercises provided.

There is also some ward-based work with inpatients as needed.

You will have the opportunity to work with the MDT in clinic, experience the TLDC, observe in theatre and spend time with therapists in other specialities whilst you are on placement here. Please speak to your supervisor at the beginning of your placement about any requests that you have so that these can be arranged.

General information

If you are going to be absent at any time during your placement, please ring as early as you can to inform your Educator. You also need to email learner.absences@lthtr.nhs.uk as student absences in the trust are recorded centrally, as well as following procedure for informing your specific university.

All staff are expected to travel to and from work in their own clothes and change on site, regardless of whether you are travelling in your own car or on public transport. Both departments have access to changing facilities and lockers. You will be shown to these on your first day.

Mobile phones are allowed within the department, and it is accepted that these may need to be accessible for students who have dependents or other caring responsibilities. They should however be kept on silent and out of view where possible other than at lunch time.





<u>Useful resources</u>

A basic knowledge of hand anatomy is desirable prior to the start of the placement. If you are familiar with the names of the bones and joints, this would be particularly helpful. There are many excellent resources online to help with this. If you have an Athens password, then you can access Anatomy TV which facilitates learning through a variety of 3D imaging. Teachmeanatomy info is another website with clear graphics and a quiz type method of learning. There are countless more besides and it's good to have a look at a few and see which one fits best with your particular style of learning.

Both websites are a good resource. There is some information aimed at health professionals and some for patients. It is all helpful.

It is also useful to understand fracture healing times, and basic principles of the management of soft tissue injuries.

Induction

The Local Induction process will take place throughout the first week of your placement.

This will comprise of:

- Trust and department orientation, including housekeeping information
- Location of emergency equipment
- IT access
- Reading & acknowledgement of Mandatory Trust policies such as Health & Safety, Fire Safety, Infection Control, Information Governance, Staff Code of Conduct, Social Networking and Dress Code policies.
- Adult Basic Life Support training if applicable
- Trust Moving & Handling Training if applicable
- COVID-related policies & procedure
- Orientation
- Professional voice: freedom to speak up, datix, chain of command, open door policy
- An awareness of our Educational Governance Team- evaluation and importance of feedback
- Inter-professional Learning Sessions
- Practice Assessment Record and Evaluation (PARE) training, if applicable
- Collaborative Learning in Practice (CLiP™), if applicable
- How the role of Practice Development Facilitator can support you, where applicable







What to bring on your first day

Inter-professional Learning Sessions and eLearning Resources

At our Trust, our Education Team facilitates a yearly programme of Inter-professional Learning (IPL) sessions. This programme consists of various teaching sessions, delivered by our Specialist Teams, to support and enhance our learners and trainees' learning experience with us.

Inter-professional learning is an important part of your development and allows you to build professional relationships and communication skills with the wider multi-disciplinary teams. Our IPL sessions are valuable in supporting you to stretch your knowledge and experiences to enhance your clinical practice. They also help bridge the gap between theory and practice, allowing you to hold a deeper understanding of the topics discussed. Our sessions are open for all learners and trainees on placement at our Trust to attend and these learning opportunities are an extension to your learning environment; therefore, these hours need to be recorded on your timesheets. We encourage our staff to facilitate enabling a learner/trainee to attend these sessions.

Please note: You must inform your learning environment prior to attending a session. These IPL sessions need to be discussed in a timely manner with your learning environment.

You are required to complete a reflection on each of your IPL sessions, as well as documenting on your HEI documentation what you have learnt and how this relates to your current placement.

Support with evidencing your learning outcomes or proficiencies

We encourage you to use the Trust learning logs to collate and evidence your skills, knowledge and abilities achieved. You can then present your completed learning logs to your Practice Assessor/Educator during your assessment meetings.

Any staff member who is involved in coaching you can complete your learning log feedback.

You can request time during your placement hours to complete these and request feedback prior to the shift ending. To obtain a copy of our learning logs, please look in the Learner Resource File on your learning environment.

Chain of Command

Keeping patients safe, providing the best care that we can and learning in an environment where you feel safe and valued is important to us. Speaking up about any concern you have on your learning environment is also important. In fact, it's vital because it will help us to keep improving our services for all patients.
