Orientation to your Learning Environment – Adult Nursing

Please complete and present at your initial meeting.

Pre-orientation 2 weeks prior to starting your Learning Environment

- ð Arrange a pre-visit to your new Learning Environment.
- ð Visit your Learning Environment; ask to be shown around and ask what to expect on your first day i.e. where do I put my belongings, where can I put my lunch, where should I go on my first day and who should I report to.
- ð Ask to be shown your Learner Board, where you will find out who your Supervisor and Assessor is.
- ð Ask to be shown your Learner Resource File.
- ð Ask to be shown your off duty and find out what the process is should you need to request an amendment. (It would be at this point that any requests are to be made).
- ð Access your learning handbook via the Health Academy webpage and start planning what you want to achieve from your Learning Environment.
- ð We advise that on your **first day you will be starting at 9am**, please discuss this with your learning environment.

First day on your new Learning Environment

- ð Introduce yourself and inform them that it's your first day.
- ð Ask to be shown around again, should you require this.
- ð Request to be shown the Team Board where the teams for the day are displayed, so you can familiarise yourself with; who is in your team, who you are working alongside and where your break times will be displayed.
- ð Ask to have the chain of command explained to you on this Learning Environment and ask who oversees this Learning Environment (i.e. Unit/Ward Manager).
- ð The local fire procedures have been explained and where you can find the equipment needed.
- ð Resuscitation equipment has been shown and explained.
- ð You know how to summon help in the event of an emergency.
- ð Lone working policy has been explained (if applicable).
- ð Risk assessments/reasonable adjustments relating to disability/learning/pregnancy needs have been discussed (where disclosed).
- ð You are aware of your professional role in practice.

Within your first week on your Learning Environment

- ð Resuscitation policy and procedures have been explained.
- ð You are aware of where to find local policies;

- Health & Safety
- Incident reporting procedures
- Infection control
- Handling of messages and enquiries
- Information Governance requirements
- Other policies
- Policy regarding Safeguarding has been explained.
- Complete your initial meeting with your Practice Supervisor/Assessor and discuss any Inter-professional Learning Sessions that you would like to attend.

Learning Environment

We would like to welcome you to your learning environment.

We specialise in Urology diagnostic procedures, these include. Flexible Cystoscopies, Precision Point biopsies, TRUS biopsies and Lithotripsy treatment.

- **Flexible cystoscopy** is a diagnostic procedure to examine the inside of your bladder under a local anaesthetic. It can also be used to take biopsies from your bladder, remove ureteric stents, or administer Botox injections into your bladder.
- **Precision Point Biopsy**- A transperineal ultrasound-guided biopsy of your prostate. This procedure allows us to provide systematic and targeted prostate biopsies under a local anaesthetic. The procedure has transformed the prostate cancer pathway and improving the patient experience, though early diagnosis and prevention.
- **TRUS biopsies**- A transrectal ultrasound scan of the prostate gland. Biopsies are taken to help to diagnose prostate cancer.
- **Lithotripsy (ESWL- Extracorporeal shock wave lithotripsy)** - Lithotripsy is a low risk, non-invasive way of treating stones in the kidney or ureter. It uses high-energy shock waves to break down the kidney stones into small enough fragments to pass out of your body in your urine.

Whilst spending time on LDCU, you will get the opportunity to spend time with a Urology Specialist Nurse, Longton Nursing staff and also Urology Theatre, where possible.

Shift times

0730 – 1730 (3 days a week) 07:30-17:00 (1 day a week)

There is an option to work from 0730 – 2000 over 3 days and finish the rest of your hours on our Surgical Ward. Please discuss this with our Sister on LDCU or the Surgical Ward as to what you would prefer to do.

Sickness policy

Please contact the ward and inform nurse in charge brief details for the reason of absence and advise how long you expect to be off. Please keep placement informed of how you are and when you will be returning to placement. You will also need to let your university know that you are off sick and email learner.absences@lthtr.nhs.uk

What to bring on your first day

You can wear clean uniform into work, but we kindly ask that you change into your own clothes when leaving shift (changing facilities provided on the ward).

We recommend that you bring enough food for a 12-hour shift (you will have x2 30min breaks, one in morning and one in afternoon). If working on LDCU you will have a 30 min break at around lunch time and finish at 17:30pm; however, you can have the option to finish a 12-hour shift on our Surgical Ward.

There is fridge, microwave and tea and coffee available in Longton. We share our break room with Longton theatre staff.

Escalation of concerns

Please go to the nurse in charge or your Practice Assessor. If you are feeling unable to speak to them, then go to the line manager. You can also escalate concerns to the Clinical Placement Support Team, your Academic Assessors or Learner Support.

Commonly used medications

As we are an outpatient clinic, we do not often use medication, however on occasions we may use the following;

- Ciprofloxacin
- Paracetamol
- Gentamicin
- Dihydrocodeine
- Diclofenac suppositories

Induction

The Local Induction process will take place throughout the first week of your placement.

This will comprise of:

- Trust and department orientation, including housekeeping information
- Location of emergency equipment
- IT access
- Reading & acknowledgement of Mandatory Trust policies such as Health & Safety, Fire Safety, Infection Control, Information Governance, Staff Code of Conduct, Social Networking and Dress Code policies.
- Adult Basic Life Support training if applicable
- Trust Moving & Handling Training if applicable
- COVID-related policies & procedure
- Orientation
- Professional voice: - freedom to speak up, datix, chain of command, open door policy
- An awareness of our Educational Governance Team- evaluation and importance of feedback
- Inter-professional Learning Sessions
- Practice Assessment Record and Evaluation (PARE) training, if applicable
- Collaborative Learning in Practice (CLiP™), if applicable
- How the role of Practice Development Facilitator can support you, where applicable



What to bring on your first day

- You may wish to bring a packed lunch and a drink on your first day.

Inter-professional Learning Sessions and eLearning Resources

At our Trust, our Education Team facilitates a yearly programme of Inter-professional Learning (IPL) sessions. This programme consists of various teaching sessions, delivered by our Specialist Teams, to support and enhance our learners and trainees' learning experience with us.

Inter-professional learning is an important part of your development and allows you to build professional relationships and communication skills with the wider multi-disciplinary teams. Our IPL sessions are valuable in supporting you to stretch your knowledge and experiences to enhance your clinical practice. They also help bridge the gap between theory and practice, allowing you to hold a deeper understanding of the topics discussed. Our sessions are open for all learners and trainees on placement at our Trust to attend and these learning opportunities are an extension to your learning environment; therefore, these hours need to be recorded on your timesheets. We encourage our staff to facilitate enabling a learner/trainee to attend these sessions.

Please note: You must inform your learning environment prior to attending a session. These IPL sessions need to be discussed in a timely manner with your learning environment.

You are required to complete a reflection on each of your IPL sessions, as well as documenting on your HEI documentation what you have learnt and how this relates to your current placement.

Support with evidencing your learning outcomes or proficiencies

We encourage you to use the Trust learning logs to collate and evidence your skills, knowledge and abilities achieved. You can then present your completed learning logs to your Practice Assessor/Educator during your assessment meetings. Any staff member who is involved in coaching you can complete your learning log feedback.

You can request time during your placement hours to complete these and request feedback prior to the shift ending. Chain of Command
