Cake



Find this recipe and more in the book: Woman & Home Christmas Cookbook Available to borrow from the <u>library</u>

Instructions:

- Heat the oven to 200°C/400°F/gas mark 6, then grease and baseline 5x15cm round cake tins.
- Put the butter, sugar, treacle and milk in a pan. Heat gently until melted, stirring. Add the flour, ginger and bicarb of soda. Slowly mix in the eggs.
- Split between the tins. Bake for 20 mins.
 Remove from the oven. Leave to cool slightly.
 Remove from the tins and cool completely on wire racks.

4. Blend the cream cheese and Biscoff spread. Sandwich the 5 cakes with thin layers of the mixture. Place the cake on a stand and spread a thin layer of mixture around the sides and top. 5. Fit a piping bag with a large star nozzle and fill with the remaining mixture. Set aside. Spoon the caramel spread into a disposable piping bag, snip off the end and pipe around the edge of the cake to create a drip effect down its sides. Pipe the remaining caramel in the centre of the cake.

 Pipe swirls of Biscoff mixture around the edge.
 Stick the gingerbread men on top. Chill, but bring to room temperature for serving.

Cook time: 1hr 15 mins Serves: 12

Ingredients:

For the cake:

- · 175g butter, cubed
- 150g dark muscovado sugar
- · 3tbsp black treacle
- · 150ml milk
- · 225g plain flour, sifted
- · 1tbsp ground ginger
- 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- · 2 eggs, lightly beaten

For the filling:

- · 360g cream cheese
- 400g Lotus Biscoff Spread

To decorate:

- 210g salted caramel, to spread
- 25g mini gingerbread men


Our Favourite Books of 2024

The book is centred around the Barnes family, as their lives implode. It is about love and loss but is often very funny as well as poignant.








Louisa's favourite: Strange Sally Diamond by Liz Nugent


Sam's favourite: Cuddy by Benjamin Myers



Sounds a bit dry but I found it really interesting and the writing is fabulous.

Our Favourite Books of 2024

Eva's favourite: Cahokia Jazz by Francis Spufford

Essentially this book is a thriller set in 1920s America that spans the course of a week. The setting is not history as we know it though, because the author imagines how things might have been in 1920s America if the variant of smallpox that arrived with European settlers had been far less deadly than it actually was. I loved it for the story and the twist at the end, as well as the historical 'what if' and for how it seemed to chime in with today's events. A great read! It made me read the author's other two novels, which I would also recommend: Golden Hill and Light perpetual.





Andrew's favourite: The Return of the Native by Thomas Hardy


Siobhan's favourite: Trio by William Boyd

It's a book you can just disappear into without too much mental challenge after a busy day, yet it offers great reward in terms of entertainment and insights into the human condition.

Set on a film set in Brighton during the 1960's, it feels glamourous but with character struggles which could still be faced today (corrupted states, LGBTQ+, unfulfilling relationships).

Boyd skilfully shows us the inner worlds of his characters and you can't help but be engrossed.

I won't spoil the ending, but the fact that I traded sleep for the need to know what happens next makes it stand out for me!





Sarah's favourite: Kingfisher Field Guide to the Mushrooms and Toadstools of Britain and Europe

In my spare time I love to take photographs of nature, in particular butterflies and wildflowers, and in the Autumn and Winter mushrooms become the colourful treasure to seek out! This particular edition comes plastic backed to use 'in the field' (or woodland!) and is the perfect size to fit in a winter coat pocket. There are beautiful hand drawn illustrations along with useful information about mushrooms including latin names and where you are most likely to encounter them. It certainly helps make winter woodland walks more fun yet doesn't overload you with information. Word of warning, my interest is in capturing their beauty in a picture, many are poisonous and disguise themselves as their safe edible cousins, so please do stick to photos only and don't rely on this for safe foraging information!
